A BILL FOR AN ACT

To appropriate the sum of \$200,000 from the General Fund of the Federated States of Micronesia for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1982, for the purpose of providing funds for student loans for post-secondary and graduate levels of training for citizens of the Federated States of Micronesia, and for other purposes.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS OF THE FEDERATED STATES OF MICRONESIA:

- Section 1. The sum of \$200,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, 1
- 2 is hereby appropriated from the General Fund of the Federated States of
- Micronesia for the fiscal year ending September 30, 1982, for the purpose of 3
- providing funds for student loans for post-secondary and graduate levels of
- 5 training for deserving citizens of the Federated States of Micronesia for
- the 1981-82 school year. 6
- Section 2. The sum loaned to a continuing or new undergraduate student 7
- 8 pursuant to this act shall not exceed the amount of the student's Basic
- Educational Opportunity Grant as determined by the Basic Educational Opportunity
- Grants Payment Schedule of Awards for the school year for which the loan is
- 11 made. The sum loaned to a graduate student pursuant to this act shall not
- 12 exceed \$2,000 for any school year.
- 13 Section 3. All funds appropriated by this act shall be allotted,
- 14 managed, administered, and accounted for in accordance with applicable law,
- 15 including, but not limited to, the Financial Management Act of 1979. The
- allottee shall be responsible for ensuring that these funds, or so much
- 17 thereof as may be necessary, are used solely for the purpose specified in this
- 18 act, and that no obligations are incurred in excess of the sum appropriated.
- The authority of the allottee to obligate funds appropriated by this act shall
- lapse as of September 30, 1982. 20
- 21 Section 4. This act shall become law upon approval by the President of
- 22 the Federated States of Micronesia or upon its becoming law without such

23 approval.
