## A BILL FOR AN ACT

To further amend Public Law No. 2-54, as amended by Public Law No. 3-1, for the purpose of adding a new chapter 7 to provide for resubmission of the Compact of Free Association to a plebiscite, the legislatures of the States of the Federated States of Micronesia, and the Congress of the Federated States of Micronesia, in the event that the United States unilaterally and materially alters the Compact in a manner detrimental to the Federated States of Micronesia, and for other purposes.

	BE IT ENACTED BY THE CONGRESS OF THE FEDERATED STATES OF MICRONESIA:		
1	Secti	on 1. Public Law No. 2-54 is hereby further amended by adding	
2	a new chap	ter 7 to read as follows:	
3		"CHAPTER 7	
4		Section 701. Additional findings. The Congress of the	
5		Federated States of Micronesia finds that:	
6		(1) The Federated States of Micronesia has ratificatied and	
7		approved the Compact of Free Association pursuant to the	
8		processes described in the preceding chapters of this act.	
9		(2) As of the date of passage of the congressional bill	
10		containing these findings, it appears very possible that the	
11		United States Congress will unilaterally amend the Compact	
12		in a manner which will materially alter it in a manner	
13		detrimental to the Federated States of Micronesia.	
14		(3) These possible amendments could make the amended	
15		Compact so different from the Compact ratified and approved	
16		by the Federated States of Micronesia, that the prior ratifi-	
17	,	cation and approval would no longer be valid.	
18		(4) Because of this possibility, it is necessary to	
19		provide by law a means by which it can be determined if such	
20		material alterations have taken place, and a means by which	
21		the amended Compact could be either ratified and approved	
22		or rejected by the Federated States of Micronesia.	

Section 702. Determination of material alteration.

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1	of this chapter if, at any time within 90 days after completion
2	of the United States' ratification and approval of the Compact,
3	any two of the following occur:
4	(1) The President of the Federated States of Micronesia
5	transmits a Presidential Communication to the Congress of the
6	Federated States of Micronesia, stating that such material
7	detrimental alterations have been made; or
8	(2) The Congress of the Federated States of Micronesia
9	adopts a resolution stating that the Congress finds that such
10	material detrimental alterations have been made; or
11	(3) The Governors of at least two States of the
12	Federated States of Micronesia transmit to the Congress of the
13	Federated States of Micronesia an official communication stating
14	that they believe such materially detrimental alterations have
L5	been made; or
L6	(4) The legislatures of at least two States of the
L7	Federated States of Micronesia adopt resolutions stating that
L8	such materially detrimental alterations have been made, and
L9	transmit these resolutions to the Congress of the Federated
20	States of Micronesia.
21	Section 703. Resubmission of Compact. If, pursuant to section
22	702 of this act, it is determined that the Compact has been
23	materially altered by the United States in a manner detrimental
24	to the Federated States of Micronesia, the Compact must be
25	resubmitted to the voters of the Federated States of Micronesia,

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the State legislatures, and the Congress of the Federated States of Micronesia for reapproval. The President and the Congress of the Federated States of Micronesia will act with all due speed in order to bring about such resubmission in a manner consistent with that described in previous chapters of this act. Section 704. Effective date. This act shall become law upon approval by the President of the Federated States of Micronesia or upon its becoming law without such apprval." Introduced by:
